Dial 811 Before You Dig

As warm weather approaches and we start tackling those outdoor projects—whether it's planting a garden, installing a fence, or building a deck—let's take a moment to remember one crucial step: call 811 before you dig. It's free, it's easy, and it could save lives, property, and a lot of headaches.

Beneath our yards and streets lie a network of underground utility lines—gas, water, electric, and telecom. Digging without knowing where these lines are can lead to serious consequences: a ruptured gas line could cause an explosion, a cut phone line could leave you without internet or landline, or a damaged water main could flood your project. Repairs can also be costly, and you might be on the hook for them if you didn't call ahead.

Dial 811 a few business days before you plan to start work to allow time for utility lines on your property to be marked. It's a small effort that ensures your project goes smoothly, safely, and you can dig with some peace of mind.
